An internationally acclaimed painter, Yoshitomo Nara first exhibited his works in Europe and the U.S. in the mid-1990s. Since then he has been one of Japan's most representative artists in the West. Today, he is well-known throughout Asia as well. It is Nara's unique ability to remind viewers of childhood experiences through his paintings of children and animals that has attracted fans from a variety of cultures and of all ages.

Born in 1959, Nara grew up in Aomori Prefecture. He went to Germany for study. Nara's earliest acrylic paintings are characterized by bold lines and color usage. These early works show figures of children and animals combined with fragments of text and small accessories such as tiny knives, toys, and cardboard boxes. As his style evolved, Nara's work became more simplified and picturesque, a form which was to become his trademark. Reduced to the basics, his paintings feature wide-eyed children and animal figures staring at the viewer from an otherwise empty canvas.

These seemingly innocent figures have provoked much discussion, however. Some critics see in the eyes of these figures the expression of a fierce independence and strong emotions. These emotions range from mild irritation, like that of a child who has been unexpectedly awakened from a nap, to a more disturbing feeling of disgust or revulsion. Others see in the eyes of Nara's figures a sad reflection of feelings of helplessness, rage, defiance, and rebellion.

Nara's work has been greatly influenced by his wide knowledge of artists, literature, and music. Indeed, his unique style of drawing later evolved from these influences. The titles of several of his works reveal another important influence—his love of folk music and punk music. In addition, Nara himself credits his inspiration to such diverse influences as the record jackets which he has collected since his childhood, illustrated books, photograph collections, and books of paintings.

The Great East Japan Earthquake of 2011 caused Nara to reconsider the role of art. He became even more determined to stress that his works were personal, not the product of a machine or a theory of some sort. A good example is the sculptures covered with hand and finger prints that he produced as a way to return to art after the tragedy. These highly individual markings seem to emphasize the force of the human spirit in the creation of art.
