E-books

In the digital age, content delivery methods are changing non-stop. Printed newspapers and magazines are disappearing one by one. Meanwhile, the interest in e-books is growing. Everything from novels to comics is being sold in digital form.

The history of e-books is surprisingly long. Back in 1985, the Grolier Encyclopedia was released on CD-ROM. Digital Book Inc. put 50 books onto floppy discs in 1993. Later, in 2007, Amazon started selling the Kindle, a device for reading e-books. It wasn't the world's first e-reader, but it was very successful.

Before long, there were more than one million different e-books on the market. Also, the range of e-readers from companies like SONY kept growing. Apple's iPad debuted in 2010, creating even more interest in the format.

The earliest e-books were usually digital versions of printed books. Over time, many brand new titles were written just for the e-book market. Famous authors like Stephen King led the way, and success followed. Sales figures for best-selling titles can number in the millions.

Digital content continues to spread in interesting ways. In 2009, Canada's Blyth Academy made history. Students were given SONY Readers containing digital versions of their textbooks. It's unclear if that is a sign of things to come. But it is safe to say the outlook for e-books is strong.

Kohei Uchimura's gold medal in the 2012 London Olympics in the men's all-around gymnastics competition* capped* his spectacular run* of three world championship titles in the three years leading up to the Olympics. No other male Japanese gymnast has ever achieved such a record.

He also won silver medals at the London Olympics in the floor exercise and in the gymnastics team event. With the two silver medals that he brought home from the 2008 Beijing Olympics, Uchimura had amassed* a total of five Olympic medals by the time he was 23 years old.

Uchimura's road to the gold in London did not start smoothly. A qualifying round* that was marred* by numerous errors landed him in only ninth place. His part in the actual team final* was similarly full of mistakes. He faced perhaps his most difficult challenge first—the pommel horse*.

The third time was a charm! He scored 15 or more points in every segment of the all-around final*: pommel horse, floor exercise, rings, vault, parallel bars, and horizontal bars. No other gymnast could match those scores.

Fans at the Olympic Stadium carried signs written in Japanese, "Give us hope, give us courage, and make us smile," a reference to the people who had suffered in the Great East Japan Earthquake in 2011. Uchimura responded, "I'm so thankful and grateful. I owe this not only to my ability, but to all the support I receive, so I want to thank everyone for this encouragement."

Uchimura, who was born in 1989 in Fukuoka Prefecture, began training when he was just three years old at a gymnastics school run by his parents. He used a stuffed toy,* a Pink Panther cartoon character, to mimic various gymnastic movements necessary for aerial* balance. Even as he grew older, he continued to carry the toy with him as a good luck charm.

His amazing gymnastic ability is probably due, in part, to his ability to see in his mind's eye each step he needs to take in a routine. He also is able to clearly visualize the environment: that is, he can imagine the exact position of the ceiling and the floor relative

to his own position. As a child, Kohei filled a sketchpad* with frame-by-frame illustrations of a series of gymnastic movements. His parents still keep the book today.
